Notice of Incorporation.

The Shoshoni Milling Company was incorporated in Cody, Big Horn county, state of Wyoming, and articles of incorporation was filed in the office of the Secretary of State, Cheyenne, Wyoming, at 2 o'clock, p. m. on the 30 day of January, A. D. 1906.

The object of the company is to conduct a general flour milling business.

Its capital stock is twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) divided into two hundred and fifty (250) shares at a par value of one hundred dollars (\$100) each.

Its term of existence is fifty (50) years. The operations of the company will be carried on in Cody Big Horn County, Wyoming.

The affairs and management of the company will be under the control of seven trustees. The trustees elected for the first year are Geo. T. Beck, Frank L. Houx, E. T. Cheese, H. R. Weston, L. L. Newton, J. M. Schwoob and W. L. Walls.

The Wyoming agent of the company is E. T. Cheese of Cody, Wyoming.

United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service.

Supervisors Head Quarters, Wapiti, Wyoming, January 25, 1906.

Provision has been made for the grazing of 20,000 head of cattle and horses and 70,000 head of sheep in the Shoshone Division of the Yellowstone Reserve during the season of 1906.

The summer grazing season for cattle and horses will be from May 1 to October 31. The grazing fees for the summer season will be 25 cents per head. Class "A," or stock belonging to reserve residents, may remain in the reserve all the year. The fees for the year, long season, will be 40 cents per head. The one-half rate limit for the Wyoming reserves is 100 head, and applies to cattle only.

In the approval of applications the sheep will be counted on a percentage basis of 80 per cent, and will be allowed in the reserve from July 15 to Sept. 15, at 5 cents per head. They will be distributed as follows:

In district No. 1, (Grey Bull water shed) 25,000 head.

In district No. 2, (Shoshone river water shed) 15,000 head.

In district No. 3, (Clark Fork and tributaries) 30,000 head.

In making application, state whether breeding ewes or dry sheep.

When application is approved; in whole or in part, the applicant will be notified, stating the amount to be paid to the Fiscal Agent for grazing fees. Upon return of the Special Fiscal Agent's receipt, to the supervisor, permits will then be issued.

Grazing No. 2—All applications must be submitted to the supervisor before March 1, 1906. Blank forms will be forwarded upon application.
