This bulletin is a condensed report of the 24th, annual convention of the Cody Family Association, held at Jackson, Michigan, July 19th, and 20th, 1952. We regret the delay of two months in publishing this report, due to the pressure of other work and being on our vacation.

Saturday, July 19th, - 1,30 p.m. - registration of members at Calvary Methodist Church in charge of Mrs. Marguerite Stanbery and Miss Beverly Siegfried. Total registration of both days of convention 137 persons, coming from various points in Michigan, Ontario, Minnesota, Iowa, Florida, Ohio, Illinois and Massachusetts. These 137 persons are descendants of the following fifth generation branches - Milla, John 1821, Nathan, Mervin, Katherine, Stephen, Anson, Elijah 1813, Melinda, Sophia 1806, Lyman, Harrison, Julia, Amanda, John Jay, Elson, Philip, Anna, Ansel, Aaron, and Lydia Odell, truly a representative cross-section of our family.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Chester Cody Crouch, followed by the opening prayer by a past president, Alvin Nelson Cody. The President then introduced the members of the Local Committee, Chairman Mrs. Marguerite Stanbery, Mrs. Alvin N. Cody, Mrs. Emily Cody Rauch, Mrs. Nellie Stanbery, Mrs. Harrison Murphy and Mr. George N. Shafer. A hearty welcome to Jackson was extended by the Local Chairman, Mrs. Marguerite Stanbery. Mrs. Blanche C. McClenahan then conducted a most inspiring memorial service in memory of 32 members of our family whose deaths have been reported since our last reunion.

The President then introduced the Secretary-Treasurer and the Assistant Secretary, Ernest William Cody and his wife Ella Jean Cody of London, Ontario, and general business was then handled.

On motions the minutes of the Lake Wales, Florida convention of 1951 were adopted, also the reports of the Secretary-Treasurer and Assistant Secretary.

The report of Miss Lydia Cody, Chairman of the Historical Board, was given by the Secretary; this report showed that definite progress is being made in our genealogy, and we expect a detailed statement of plans and policy will be ready for publication within a few months.

General discussion took place regarding the betterment of our financial position. The importance of payment of annual dues was stressed, also the sale of the 1952 Directory. The Secretary told of the work involved in the preparation of this new Directory and asked for support in its future sales. Comments on the Directory were most favorable.

A motion was carried that the present Board of Directors remain in office for another year.

General discussion took place regarding the 1953 convention and it was decided this would be held in Southern Ontario at a time and place to be later decided by the Southern Ontario cousins and the Board of Directors.

An outstanding event of the afternoon meeting was the introduction of Mrs. Edith Cody Bowerman of Toronto, Ontario, who, in her 90th. year, came alone to the convention. We salute "Aunt Edith"; she puts many of us to shame by her interest and support of our family organization.

6.30 p.m.

A splendid dinner was served by the Crusaders Class of Calvary Church and members of the Youth Fellowship of the church. The dinner party was called to order by the President and the invocation was the singing of our Cody Family hymn "How Firm A Foundation" under theleadership of our Song Master, George N. Shafer. The President then turned the dinner program over to the Mistress of Ceremonies, Mrs. Emily Cody Rauch, our Regional Vice President for this area, who welcomed us to Michigan. At this time a presentation of flowers was made to our Local Chairman of Arrangements, Mrs. Marguerite Stanbery. The program continued with songs led by George N. Shafer, a piano solo by Margie Ann Baker, baton twirling by Janet Siegfried accompanied by Jeanne Stanbery and a short address by a veteran past president, Richard Aldus Cody. We then thoroughly enjoyed a one act play "John's Troubles" by members of the Teen Players of Calvary Church under

the direction of Mrs. Marguerite Stanbery. We also enjoyed moving pictures of Colonel William Frederick Cody (Buffalo Bill) in person, taken in 1913 and 1914, and graciously loaned for the occasion by Mr. Hiram S. Cody of Winston-Selem, N.C. With last minute announcements, the singing of Auld Lang Syne, and the benediction by the Rev. Thomas Pollard, minister of the church, our evening's program came to an end.

A motorcade of cars, under the direction of Mr. Max Stanbery, left the church to view the illumination of Jackson Cascades.

11.00 a.m. Sunday, July 20th. - about eighty members of our family assembled for the regular church service at Calvary Methodist Church and enjoyed the excellent message of the Rev. Thomas Pollard.

1.30 p.m. - Picnic luncheon was served at Cascades Park. The serving of this fine luncheon was in the hands of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Rauch and their three sons, Edward, Victor and Ernest; they did a fine job for us.
