

Museums of the West Beckon to Cody Family Reunion Participants

If you are driving to the International Family Convention, or flying through Denver, take the opportunity to visit the Buffalo Bill Memorial Museum and the grave site of William F. Cody. The Museum is located near the site where Buffalo Bill is buried and has an excellent collection of Wild West Show memorabilia It has a fine collection of antique firearms and a gallery devoted to native American artifacts. For specific information about the museum and special events that are planned contact the Buffalo Bill Memorial Museum, 987 1/2 Lookout Mt. Rd. Golden CO 80401. Telephone: (303) 526-0744. The museum publishes a bi-monthly newsletter, Buffalo Bill Quarterly: Museum Happenings that should be of interest to Cody cousins.

Once you're in Cody, you won't want to miss The Buffalo Bill Historical Center (see page 5 for more information). But there's much more available in the area for muscum enthusiasts who want to continue their exploration of the roots of the West. Pay a visit to Powell's Homesteader Museum, or take a short drive to Meeteetse to see the Meeteetse Hall Museum and Meeteetse Museum and Archives. In Cody, panoramic murals by Edward T. Grigware tell the story of

Cody Family Directory to be published in 1996

The Directory consists of an alphabetical list by surname of living family members whose addresses are known. Each entry includes fif/gen number, birth date, marriage date, spouse name, names of children and current address. This information is a synopsis of the information that is maintained in the genealogy. The next issue of the Review will have information about ordering your copy of this valuable family resource.

How to Get to Cody


By Car: Interstates 25 and 90 allow an approach to Cody from the southeast and east.

From I-90, follow US-14 west to Cody.

From the north, Montana 310 connects I-90 with WY-120 into Cody.

From the south, take I-25 to Casper and then US-20 to Thermopolis and WY-120 to Cody.

By Air: Yellowstone Regional Airport in Cody serves the area with commuter flights from Denver, offered by major carriers.



What to do in Buffalo Bill Country

Buffalo Bill's Yellowstone Country is one of the West's great places.

It's surrounded on four sides by mountains, bursting with recreational opportunities, inhabited by the friendliest people in the United States, and rich in wildlife. Big Horn sheep can be seen perched on rocky crags southwest of Cody. Buffalo, elk, antelope, moose, and mule and whitetail deer are a part of the landscape. Yellowstone Country is also home to hundreds of species of birds. Hawks and several kinds of eagles, including our national bird, the Bald Eagle, soar in the cloudless skies.

Photograph wildlife, river raft, hike, backpack, horseback ride, camp, snowmobile...or just relax and take in the scenery. There's a lot to do! For the solitary trout fisherman, there are Blue Ribbon trout streams like portions of the Clarks Fork of the Yellowstone (Wyoming's only wild and scenic river) and Shoshone Rivers. Fishing and boating are also great at the Big Horn Canyon Recreational Area east of Powell.

Fishermen can pursue their passion in high mountain lakes or in streams ranging from tiny brooks to the top-notch trophy waters of Yellowstone Park. The North Fork of the Shoshone and the smaller streams of Sunlight Basin and Crandall combine the West's finest scenery with its best fishing. Lake fishing is also popular at the Buffalo Bill Reservoir, Newton Lake near Cody and in numerous stocked small lakes.

The Buffalo Bill Reservoir has been singled out by windsurfers as one of the great places to catch the wind in the West. Others have found the granite cliffs rising above the Buffalo Bill Dam west of Cody excellent for rock-climbing and the bravest among them have expanded their sport to world-class ice-climbing southwest of Cody. For a change of pace, professional and novice shooters will enjoy the Cody Shooting Complex or the Heart Mountain Rod and Gun Club near Powell, for benchrest, skeet, trap, sporting clays and archery.

Yellowstone Country's blue skies and temperate climate are ideal for golf. Choose between Cody and Powell for 18-hole golf or play both!

The Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody is the crown jewel of Buffalo Bill's Yellowstone Country. Founded in a single log building shortly after the death of "Buffalo Bill" Cody, the Historical Center has grown in its 75-year history to 230,000 square feet (that's six football fields!) and is now made up of four museums: The Buffalo Bill Museum, The Whitney Gallery of Western Art, The

Plains Indian Museum and The Cody Firearms Museum. Seen together the four museums tell the story of the development of the American West. It has been called "the Smithsonian of the West" and that's a perfect description. Each summer, a major exhibition is mounted at the Historical Center and an accompanying Summer Institute attracts lecturers and students from all over the world.


