





#### The Cody Family Reunites in LeClaire, Iowa this Summer

William F. Cody was born February 26, 1846, in a log cabin on a farm about two miles west of LeClaire, lowa. In 1849, his family moved to this house (pictured bottom left), that sat across from the Mississippi River.

The history of LeClaire began in the mid 1830s, when the first settlers came to the area. From the 1850s through the 1870s, LeClaire was a bustling center of industry and, above all, as a major participant in the history of Mississippi River trade and transportation.

The Codys stayed in LeClaire until 1853, when Willie was around 7 years old.





In his memoir, Life of Buffalo Bill, Cody recalls, "My father did not make a successful farmer, he abandoned the log cabin of my nativity and moved the family to a little village on the Mississippi, named LeClaire."

William, called "Willie" as a boy, had fond memories of growing up along the banks of the Mississippi. He recounted: "At LeClaire, I was sent to a school where, by diligence and fairly good conduct I managed to familiarize myself with the alphabet, but further progress was arrested by a suddenly developed love for skiff-riding on the Mississippi, which occupied so much of my time thereafter that really I found no convenient opportunity for further attendance at school." Later in memoir, he added "I foraged among neighboring orchards and melon patches, rode horses when I was able to catch them grazing on the commons, trapped innocent birds, and sometimes tied up the exposed clothes of my comrades while they were in swimming. I would not like to admit any greater crimes, no worse than the ordinary every-day boy who goes barefoot, wears a brimless hat, one suspender and a mischievous smile."





We first met Mark and his wife Donna at our 2019 Reunion in Cody, WY where we enjoyed their company and heard about Mark's career as a wildlife manager and trapper and his excitment over his upcoming semester at the Dallas Theological Seminary. Mark then earned his Master of Arts in Chaplaincy and Ministry Care with high honors and won the G. William Bryan DTS Faculty Award in Christian Service.

During the pandemic, he worked over the summer of 2021 in Clinical Pastoral Education at the Baptist Health System in San Antonio and became certified in Intercultural Competencies for Ministry by the Mexican American Catholic College there.

### Bison Bridge



Living Lands & Waters' Founder, Chad Pregracke, envisions the Quad Cities' I-80 Mississippi Bridge as a National Park.

For 4 years, Chad Pregracke has been lobbying for his visionary idea of the world's longest wildlife crossing to be adminstered and maintained as a National Park.

The Bison Bridge Foundation has announced a partnership with the University of Illinois and Iowa State University.

Currently, Ilinois' DOT, the National Parks Service and the Federal Highways Administration are considering the issue.

In Chad's vision, the bison and the community are safely separated from one another by a barrier. One side of the bridge is for human traffic and the other is for wildlife crossings.

Philip 148's Moccasin



Sally Chandler was cleaning out her closet one day when she found an Indian moccasin and recognized it as a 175-year old relic of her great-great-grandfather, our Philip 148. OMG!

Philip 148 born in 1816, was the 11th child of our Philip 55, who left Massachusetts for New York, where he married Lydia Martin and immigrated to Canada. Philip 55 took his family to East Cleveland, OH when Philip 148 was about 17.

There, in 1837 Philip 148 married Harriet M. Sherwin and they took their toddler son Darwin to Davenport on the Mississippi. They were joined by Philip's brother Isaac 145, who came looking for opportunities. Harriet bore her 2nd child, Lindus in 1840, but in 1842 the pregnant wife prevailed upon her husband and they returned to East Cleveland.

After Aldus, their 3rd child was born, Philip 148 and Harriet pioneered in Sheboygan Falls WI, where Philip caught pneumonia and died in 1846. Harriet's brother Frank brought her and the boys back to Cleveland where she died in 1854.

The orphaned boys grew up and had families of their own. Darwin went to Grand Rapids, Aldus died in Nebraska and Lindus later moved to Florida. Lindus' 10th child, Gertrude married William Wheaton, their 2nd child was Gertrude, Sally's mother and Philip's moccasin came with the lineage.

Now Sally is happy because she found a good home for it. Isn't it time to find a good home for your heirlooms?



The linen, china, glass, and porcelain had been provided with equal care, and a big woodfire lent cheerfulness to the dining-tent. This was floored and carpeted with much care, and for years afterward travellers and settlers recognized the sites upon which these camps had been constructed by the quantities of empty bottles..." # "Texas Jack, America's First Cowboy Star"




A Confederate scout and spy from Virginia, John B. "Texas Jack" Omohundro left for Texas within weeks of Lee's surrender at Appomattox. In Texas, he became first a cowboy and then a trail boss—jobs that would inform the rest of his life. Jack drove cattle over the Chisholm and Goodnight-Loving trails to New Mexico, California, Kansas, and Nebraska. In 1868 he met James B. "Wild Bill" Hickok in Kansas and then William F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody in Nebraska at the end of the first major cattle drive to North Platte. Texas Jack and Buffalo Bill became friends, and both men would become national celebrities and heros of Ned Buntline's dime novels. This biography offers a portrait of a fascinating character in the story of the Old West—and in the story of celebrity in American culture.

Matthew Kerns is a historian, web developer, and digital archivist who lives with his wife and children in Chattanooga, Tennessee. His most recent public project is the Walter Becker Media Project, as reported in *Rolling Stone*. He manages a blog, a YouTube channel, the popular Western podcast *Dime Library*, and the Texas Jack Facebook page. He has had multiple articles about Texas Jack published in *The Texas Jack Scout*, the triennial publication of the Texas Jack Association.

Matthew was the guest lecturer at LeClaire's Buffalo Bill Museum when the ICFA visited there during our recent Reunion and we greatly enjoyed an hour with him. The brief bio above doesn't mention Matthew's keen sense of humor, personal charm and the genuine enthusiasm he has for his subject.

## "Sugar Creek, Life on the Illinois Prairie"

Maple sugar helped draw pioneer Robert Pulliam to Sangamon County and lent Sugar Creek its name when it was first mapped in 1815, when it flowed clean and clear, bordered by giant sycamores, cottonwood, hickories and oak.

Sugar Creek is a common placename in the Midwest, and John Mack Faragher, who teaches at Mt. Holyoke College, has written a refreshingly uncommon history of successive settlements along one such stream in southern Sangamon County (near Springfield IL).

His book is just as remarkable for what it is not as for what it is. For one thing, Sugar Creek is a history of white settlement that neither stereotypes nor sentimentalizes the Indian culture thus displaced. The Kickapoo tribe had settled in the area during the 18th century, but by 1814 were outnumbered two-to-one by whites throughout Illinois. Noted for their skill as hunters and horsemen, their permissiveness as parents and their ferocity as warriors, they resisted pioneer encroachment until 1815, when they signed a treaty and began withdrawing westward. Despite such dispossession, Faragher reports that the Kickapoo nation today has the highest proportion of full-bloods of any tribe in the country and retains its culture to an unusual degree.

Equally noteworthy, Sugar Creek portrays mid-19th century pioneer life in and around Sangamon County without focusing on the region's most famous settler of the period, Abraham Lincoln.
