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Registration commenced at the Elks Hall in charge of Miss Lillie Dallaje of Red Deer; total registration 115 persons, coming from Alberta, Kansas, Ohio, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Ontario, Montana, California and Nebraska. These $l l 5$ persons are descendants of the following fifth generation branches of our family - Stephen, Isaac 1811, Milla, Sophia (Thornton), John 1821, Harrison, Darius, Thomas, Anson, Alonzo, Charles and David.

Our President, Dr. Ernest Edwin Cody of Ann Arbor, Mich. was unavoidably absent and the Vice President, Chester Cody Crouch of Columbus, Ohio, called the meeting to order with the singing of "O Canada", followed by opening prayer by Mirs. Edith Cody Dallaire of Red Deer. A warn welcome to the Red Deer district was extended by Herbert John Cody of Sylvan Lake. His Worship, Niayor Bettenson Mayor of the City of Red Deer then offered a few remarks of welcome to the city. Our Chairman of Local Arrangements, Mrs. Olga Cody Comer of Penhold was then introduced.

The Vice President then introduced the Secretary-Treasurer, Ernest William Cody of London, Ontario, who presented the following business program:

1. Minutes of Salem; Oregon reunion of Sept. 17-18-1949 declared adopted; moved by Peter Gordon McGachie, seconded by Herbert John Cody.
2. Secretary's report - he outlined the work handled during the past year, and especially the additional volume of correspondence in connection with the preparation of the Cody Family Genealogy and the 1951 Cody Family Directory. He asked for more prompt co-operation in the return of material for these two books.
3. Treasurer's report - figures showed a balance of $\$ 37.16$ on hand, with all accounts paid; this amount will be entirely used by the end of the year in current expenses; he urged a greater and more prompt payment of annual dues of one dollar.
4. The Secretary-Treasurer then presented the report of Miss Lydia Cody of Clevelana , Ohio, Chairman of the Historical Board. This showed that our genealoछy is nearing completion. The present handicap is the slow response of our families in submitting their biographical material. Many hundreds of letters have been written during the past few months requesting this biographical data and the slow and incomplete response is discouraging. This material is being collected by the Secretary-Treasurer and will be edited and put in shape for publication by liiss Lydia Cody, Chairman Historical Board. It will help us geatily in the completion of the task if all families will hurry in the material asked for.
5. The Socretary-Treasurer then presented a progress report on the 1951 Directory, which showed that fair progress was being made in the assembly of information for this book. It is a big task. General discussion followed conceming the book and the need of a new edition.

SPECLAL INSERT NOTE - we are still waiting on replies to over 300 letters, many of them since April lst. regarding directory and biographical material; this is most discouraging. Several members have sugesested to us that we publish a "dishonor list" of those members who have not forwarded their material - do you want your name on this list? We have a record of all the letters written and when and to whom sent, so please hurry this in to us, so wo won't have to publish a "dishonor list"。
6. The following report from Mrs. Mary Jester Allen of Cody, Wyoming, Chairman of the Memorial Board and Curator of the Buffalo Bill museum at cody, was received with keen interest:
"Dear Cousins and Liombers of the Cody Fanily -
"The Buffalo Bill Kemorial Association, Inc。 joins with me in sending greetings to the Cody Ramily assembled at Red Deer for our 2and. Annual Reunion. We know that you will have a successful meeting, and a delightful visit.
"As Director of the Buffalo Bill Museum at Cody, I ann happy to send the following report on the museum's development of the past year:

1. The City of Cody has now returned all deeds to the Buffalo Bill Memorial Association, Ince together with a suitable financial settlement. Thus, the Museum, the Buffalo Bill Statue, the athletic field, the veterans housing units, and all of our original land holdings are completely and permanently restored. With the successful termination of our case, we have sensed a gratifying feeling of corimunity good-will and support. Emest J. Goppert, President of the Buffalo Bill Memorial Association, and one of the most able attorneys in the State of Wyoming, did a magnificent piece of work on our behalf. I should like to register before your assembled memoers an expression of our gratitude to him.
2. We now have the Buffalo Bill boyhood home on the museum grounds, standine a few yards from the west door of the museum building and fitting nicely into the present group of six buildings. Mr. Harry W. Thurston of Cody was the Board member who directed the removal of the old house from the Burlington station (two miles from the museum) to our grounds, and who supervised the first steps in the long-range restoration of the building. Those first steps included the foundation essential repairs to the roof, the flloors, etc., a preservative coat of paint, and the fencing in of the inmediate yard about the old house. Visitors are not allowed in the house this year as it is still unsafe for the volune of traffic it would have to neet. We plan a careful, slow and accurate period restoration, and we need and wolcome sugeestions and help from Cody Family members so that this project - dear to all our hearts - will meet with your approval. Do write to us about any outstanding restorations in your sections of the country; in order that we may contact experienced people in this field.
3. The 1949 season brought fine attendance during the four months that the huseum was open to visitors. Part of the income from the admissions was spent on movirig the boyhood home to the grounds; part was invested in an expensive but needed completion of public rost room facilities; somo money was also spent on repairs on the museum building, now 23 years old. However, we ended the year with a modest cash reserve and we are in a financially sound if not exactly affluent state.
4. The 1950 season got under way on May 28th. Attendance thus far has been good, although the threat of war with the resulting slowing down of travel is being currently felt in Yellowstone National Fark and elsewhere in this region.
5. Our Fourth of July celebration this year went off beautifully, highlighted by Colonel Walter F. Siegmund's presentation to the museum of the farnous 1873 model Winchester rifle ownod and used by Colonel William F. Cody. Colonel Siegmund, an official of the Winchester Arms Co. and a world ramous individual collector of firearms, has given us such dignified publicity, that our 23 year record for attendance on a single day was broken on July 4 th, , and since then crowds of poople have been coming in daily to view this latest important addition.
6. The Princeton University Surmer School of Geology students, under the direction of our old friend, Dr. Taylor Thom, are again with us. They are setting up a fine permanent geological exhibit and mernbers of the University faculty will give a series of lectures at the museum this summer.

Again our greetings from Cody. Either my daughter or I will surely be present at the next meeting and we all hope to have your 1952 reunion at cody, Wyoming, to help us celebrate the 25th, anniversary of the founding of this museum. In the meantime, we are delighted to welcome you individually as you visit Cody."
