Hopkinton's Charm Invites You in August

OLD NEW ENGLAND will provide a richly historic setting for the thirty-fifth annual reunion of the International Cody Family Association, when the clan convenes on Saturday, August 15 at the Framingham Motor Inn.

Within an hour's driving distance are such names as Webster, Dudley, Uxbridge, Grafton, Holliston, Sherborn, Medway, Monson, and Oxford, with places like Pittsfield, Beverly, Ipswich and Sheffield a little farther away.

Some of the names in Cody Family history no longer appear on the maps, but Massachusetts is a concentrated country—a land of magnificently short distances. There is much that can be seen and done.

Hopkinton is the one name that appears most frequently in the annals of Philip and Martha's first three generations. And Hopkinton is the specific set-

Last Proofs for Directory Included in This Issue; Send Data on Your Branch

WITH THIS ISSUE of Cody Review the last proofs of the forthcoming directory are included.

"In many cases information is published known to be incomplete because no correspondence has been received since the 1952 directory was published," explains Secretary Aldus Cody. "Even though information may have been furnished to Secretary Ernest it is necessary to resubmit it in order for it to appear in the 1964 directory now scheduled for fall printing."

Because the family records will be photographically reproduced publication of future directories will be relatively inexpensive. "Because these records are designed so that subsequent children, marriages and deaths can be readily added, original data such as name, ancestry, birthdate and birthplace, etc., will not have to be composed over again.

"For that reason we are making every possible effort to have the original information complete and correct at this time."

Since publication of the May issue many members have furnished additional or correcting information. This data will be incorporated in the final forms to be printed in the Fall.

Deadline for material to be included in the new directory has been set as August 16—reunion date in Hopkinton. "This should give everyone an opportunity to dig out the detailed information that proper family records demand."

By providing proof in the form shown in this issue of The Review, many dollars of correspondence have been saved. "But it is up to the individuals concerned to voluntarily bring up to date the information concerning their family or branch."

The new directory will be just what the name suggests: a directory. It will include alphabetical listings by name of the head of the household, with cross references for females by their given

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ling for our gathering.

It will be at Hopkinton on Saturday afternoon that members of the family will make the acquaintance of Mrs. Elizabeth Strong, historian at the Public Library, and make local sightseeing trips on an informal basis.

Sunday morning worship will be in the Hopkinton Congregational Church and the Sunday afternoon family business meeting will follow luncheon at nearby Carbone's restaurant.

However, headquarters hotel will be at Framingham where the Motor Inn will serve the Saturday night family banquet. (Special rates of \$14 double, \$16 twin and \$10 single are available through R. Stanley Cody, 44 Bicknell St., Attleboro, Mass., 02703 or directly from the Inn (Phone 617 TR2-1206)).

The original Philip is said to have sold his Beverly home in 1723 and moved to Hopkinton where land records for the first time reveal use of the Cody name as we know it. Previously it has been written Gody or Legody.

The sons and daughters of Philip and Martha are believed to have been born in Beverly and the first record of a Cody birth at Hopkinton would be that of Susannah, daughter of John² whose birth is given by Lydia Cody as 1726.

Joseph² apparently migrated to Ipswich, Mass., where Joseph³ was born in 1726, but had joined his brothers at Hopkinton by 1733 when his Ipswich wife, Mary Martin joined the church in 1733. He died in Hopkinton in 1756.

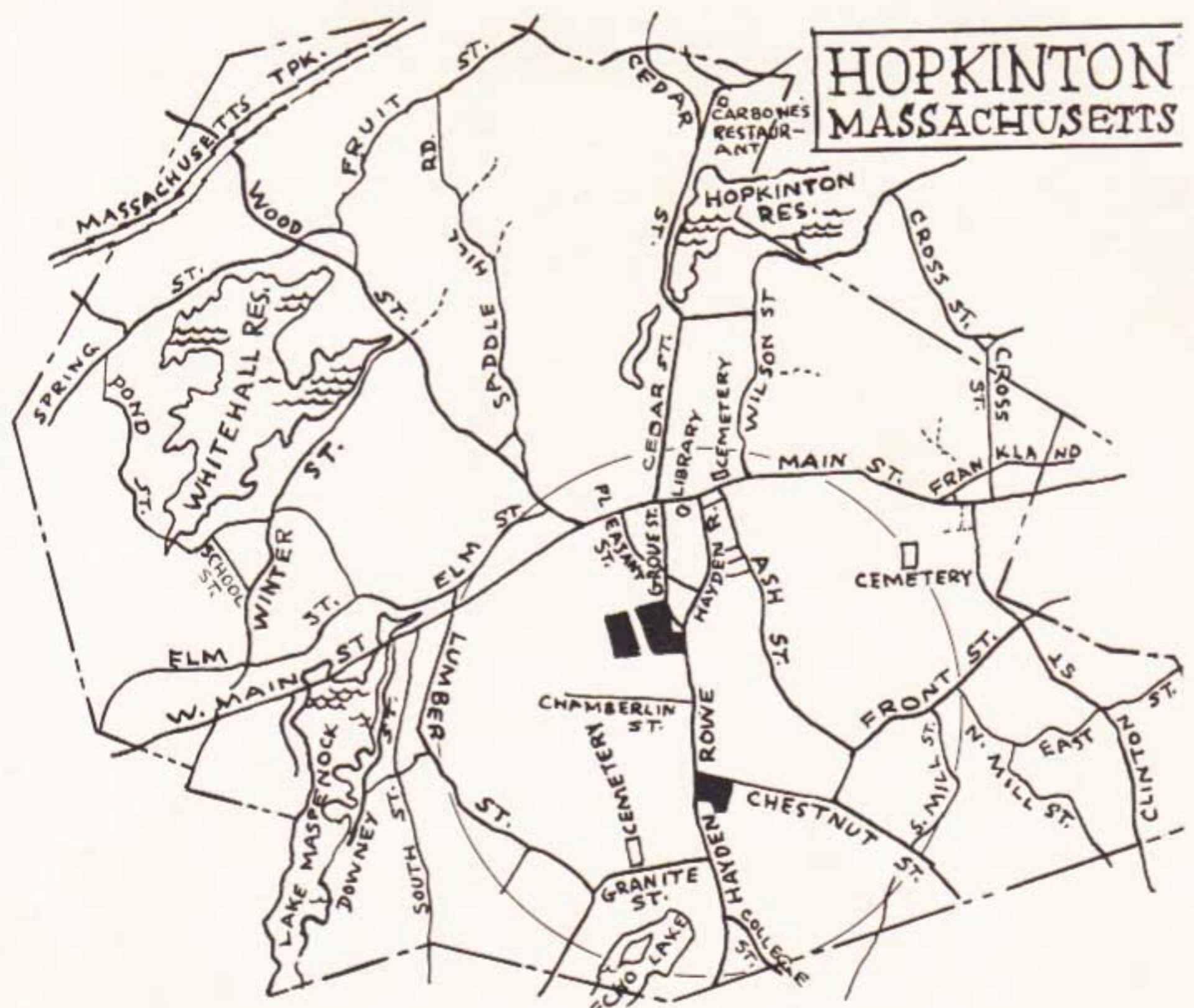
Isaac² married in Hopkinton in 1733 a Hopkinton girl, Hannah Carryl, and his two children were born and raised in Hopkinton. He died there about 1737.

Lucy³, daughter of John and first of the third generation, joined the church in Hopkinton in 1761, married James Nutt of Hopkinton in 1749, and their eight children are all believed to have been born in Hopkinton.

Abraham, Thomas, and Mary, all were baptised in Beverly, and all died unmarried, Thomas and Mary appearing on the church records at Hopkinton.

Susannah³ born at Beverly, married Phineas Pratt of Grafton.

Of John's eight children only Lucy, Susannah and Mary have recorded descendants. Mary also married a Grafton man, Solomon Goodell, but her son, Moses, was born at Hopkinton.

Of Joseph's seven children, five have recorded descendants. Joseph³ was born in 1726, joined church in Hopkinton in 1748, served in the Colonial army in 1755. He served as constable in 1847 and moderated the town meeting in 1761. He bought land in Hopkinton and Holliston and at Sheffield. He married a Hopkinton girl, Mary Whitney.

Records of Mary³ show she married in Hopkinton and her daughter was baptised in Hopkinton.

Philip³ was born at Ipswich and baptised there. He lived with his parents at Hopkinton but, married at Uxbridge, and later moved to Uxbridge to be nearer his wife's parents, variously given as Eastman or Emerson, baptised some of his children at Dudley and Oxford, eventually moved to Peru where he died in 1808. Three of his sons were in the Revolution; one, David, died in service.

Jerusha³ resided at Hopkinton and Templeton, marrying John Dearth (once spelled DeArth) of Sherbourne whose parents lived in Milton. No records are shown for her ten children.

Jonathon³, baptised at Ipswich, lived most of his life at Hopkinton, married an Ipswich girl, owned property at Framing-

ham at one time. Of his eight children only three are recorded with descendants.

Isaac³ was born raised and married at Hopkinton, farming some at Monson, but at the age of 60 moved to Vernon, N. Y., probably starting the westward trek of the Cody family?

Isaac²'s two children were born at Hopkinton, but only his second son Joseph³ survived childhood. Joseph lived at Upton, Milford and Mendon, was active in the Revolution. He married Mary Parmenter at Upton and his first four children were recorded born at Mendon. Of the 11 children, records are complete for all.

Although the fourth generation kept ties in Hopkinton, the times were restless and the dispersion continued. Joseph³'s Mary was the only one of his children to remain in the vicinity of her birthplace. Martha moved to New York state where she is buried at Skaneateles, Sarah is buried in Pompey, N. Y., Anna moved with her husband to Marcellus, N. Y., Joseph⁴ raised his family in Charleston, N. Y., Hannah moved to Cheshire, Utica, Marcellus and Granby, N. Y., Elijah wound up in Oxford county, Ontario, Daniel is buried in Waterford, Ohio, John in Evansville, Ind., and Rhoda in Marcellus, N. Y.

Philip³'s children included Philip⁴ who died at Westboro, Joseph⁴ who moved first to Manlius, N. Y., then to Ontario where his burial is recorded near Newmarket; Abigail, whose residence is given at Pittsfield; Philip⁴ who moved from Charlestown, Mass., to Central New

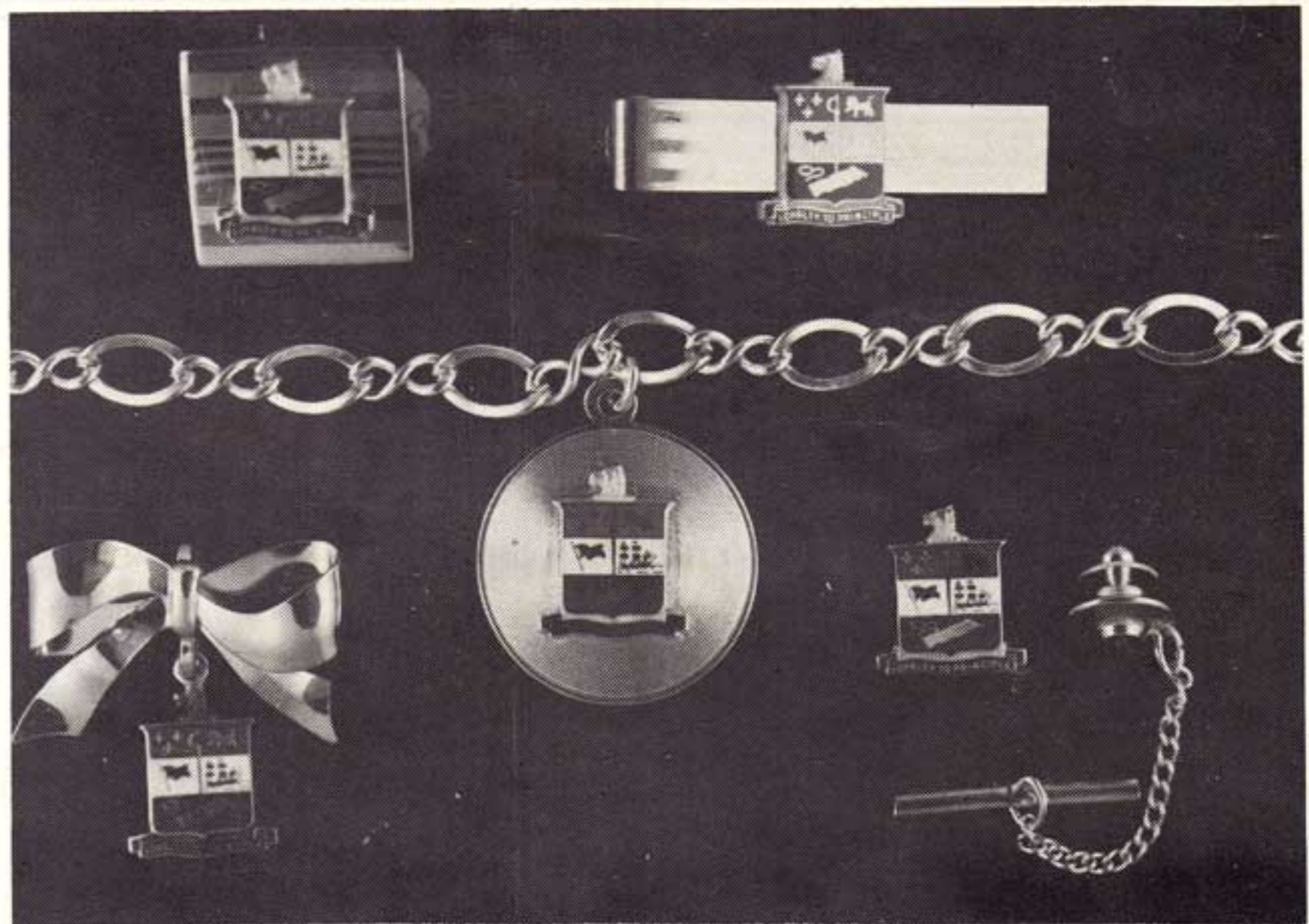

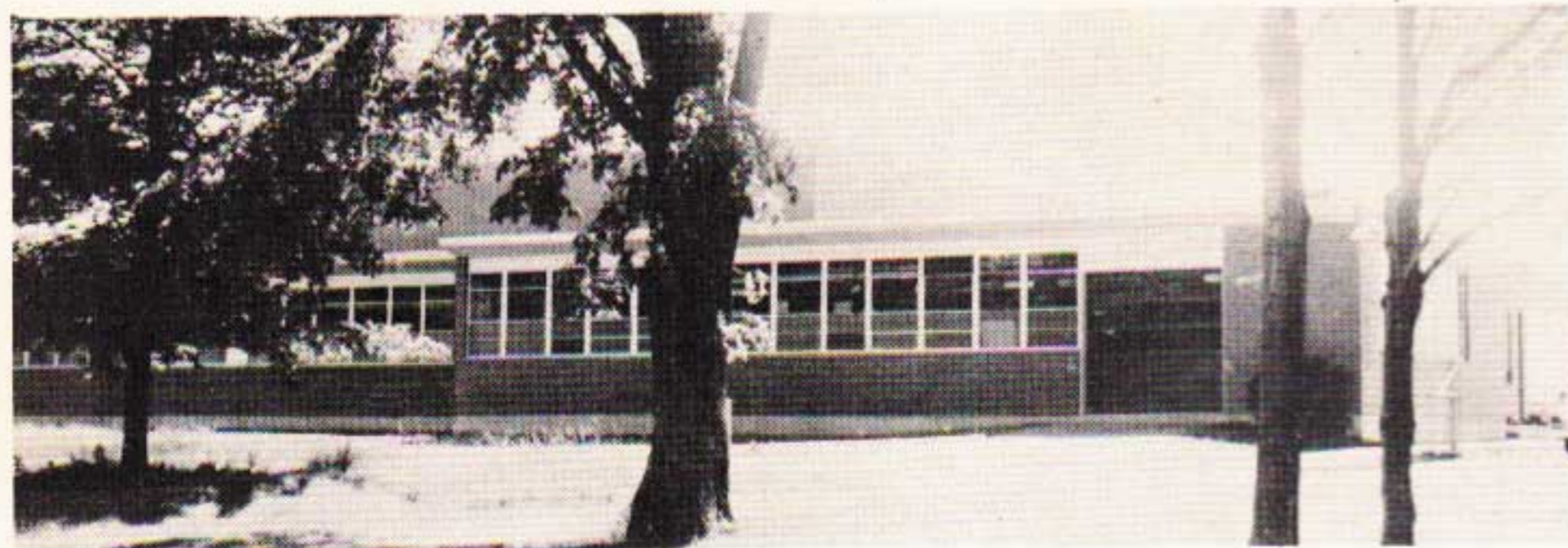

names.

A policy will be followed to include only names for which a mailable current address is available—except in the case of deceased persons, who will be identified by their last known address and withdrawn from the directory after one printing.

"I want to thank the hundreds of loyal members who have furnished genealogical data for the current directory," Secretary Aldus states. "On the other hand there are many hundreds listed in the 1952 directory for which we have no known address and therefore cannot include at this time."

The directory is being financed by a trust fund created by contributions of \$10 or more from Cody descendants from coast to coast. Orders are being taken for single copies at \$5 per copy.

Route Given from World Fair

MEMBERS OF the Cody Clan attending the New York World's Fair in conjunction with the trip to Hopkinton may be interested in the AAA recommendations for travel between these points.

Going north from New York City, use the Hutchinson River Parkway, the Merritt Parkway, the Wilbur Cross Parkway and U.S. 5 to Hartford, Connecticut 15 to Sturbridge and the Massachusetts Turnpike to Exit 12. From Exit 12 go west on Massachusetts 9 and south on Massachusetts 85 to Hopkinton. Exit 12 is also the proper exit for Framingham and a direct route between Framingham and Hopkinton is Massachusetts 134.
